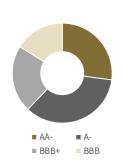

Monthly Commentary

MIF returned 0.58% (net) in September. The 6 month net return was 2.88% and the 12 month net return was 5.68% at the end of September. Over the past 12 months the fund has returned 1.49% above the Ausbond Bank Bill Index.

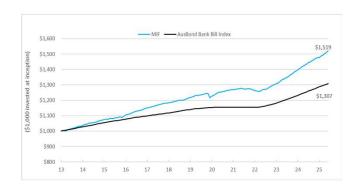
Local monetary policy expectations were active, with rate cut expectations easing as the month unfolded – mainly driven by the CPI data. The cash rate held at 3.60% on 30 Sep 2025, after three cuts earlier in 2025 (including a -25 bp cut in August to 3.60%). Growth has regained some momentum, but with some upside risk to inflation, particularly in services and housing, the scope and timing of further rate cuts could be limited. The labour market is loosening at the margin without cracking; while wage growth has cooled. Sum this up and we have an easing cycle that has paused, with further cuts hinging on Q3 inflation and labour data.

RBA Governor Bullock testified before a Parliamentary economics committee in September. Bullock judged Australia's economy remains in a "good place," with inflation continuing to ease and the labour market holding up relatively well. She indicated the recent rate cuts are expected to stimulate household and business spending, though with lags. That said, she stressed significant uncertainties and risks—for instance, weaker-than-expected consumer demand or external shocks. Bullock emphasised that while further easing of policy could be warranted, the RBA must be "alert to the risk that circumstances may change and be prepared to respond if necessary."

It was another constructive month for A\$ credit spreads despite continued deal flow. 10NC5 year major bank Tier 2 spreads finished the month at +132bps, the lowest level we have seen since coming out of COVID in 2021. Senior spreads are showing similar performance, with major bank 5 year senior now trading under +70bps. This makes the Tier 2 versus senior ratio stable around the 1.9x area, which intuitively still makes holding Tier 2 attractive despite the fact levels are at 4 year lows.

Three of the four major banks are going into their reporting period so new issuance in October is looking less likely. The past few deals have also gone to offshore markets, so no immediate need to tap the local market for new issuance. This will further support secondary spreads with new issuance unlikely to be the catalyst for any widening. Instead, we continue to look at equity markets with a significant sell-off a risk. That being said, as we move towards the end of the calendar year, outside of a new macro shock it is hard to see anything but a continuation of the strength we have seen since mid year.
